Hola, hola! I cannot believe another half term has gone by! Time flies when you are having fun! And as each half-term, here I am to tell you more things about me and Spain.



That opens a debate really about the weather in Spain, do we get nice warm sunny weather all year around? The answer is **IT DEPENDS ON THE REGION!!** Andalucía (South of Spain) is 7 times bigger than Northern Ireland, so If here I leave the house in Belfast in a nice and sunny day and I arrive to Glengormley, and it is grey covered in snow...What do you think it happens in Spain? The same, weather changes from region to region







Now exams are out of our way and with the festive spirit we will be enjoying some Christmas activities within the Spanish department. Our students will learn some **Spanish traditions** that I will kindly share with you all.

There is no Santa Claus in Spain, instead, the presents are usually delivered to children on 6th January by **Los Reyes Magos**, the Three Wise Men.





Almost every person in Spain takes part in the Christmas lottery, usually buying a fraction of a ticket and choosing the same numbers as their friends or colleagues. This unique Christmas lottery is known as **'El Gordo,'** which means 'the fat one.' The winning numbers are usually revealed on live TV throughout the morning of December 22nd. Additionally, local school children sing the winning numbers and the jackpot amounts!

Spaniards eat grapes to celebrate New Year: In Spain, the tradition of eating 12 grapes on New Year's Eve (Nochevieja) is a ritual to bring good luck for each month of the upcoming year and it is called **"Las campanadas".** At midnight on December 31st, Spaniards eat one grape with each chime of the clock, symbolising prosperity, and success.





El portal de Belén: As Spain is traditionally a Catholic country, many believers choose to remember the original meaning of Christmas and display these models of Bethlehem, scenes which use small models and figures to represent the Nativity Scene of the birth of Jesus.

April Fools' Day in December: Here and in many other cultures, we are used to having April Fools' Day on 1st April. Spain is different and they do it on 28th December with the **Día de los Santos Inocentes**. Watch your back if you're in Spain on this day because you might be in for a surprise.
